(a) Legal status of Odia as the official language of the State of Odisha and provisions therein:

- (1) The Odisha Official Language Act, 1954 was enacted by the Odisha State Legislative Assembly.
 - (2) Odisha Act No.18 of 1963 provides that English may continue to be used, in addition to Odia in the State Legislature.
 - (3) Act No. 12 of 1985 provides that although Odia shall be used as the language for official purposes the Odia numbers shall not be used and the international form of Indian numerals shall be used.
 - (4) By means of a notification of the General Administration dated 29 March, 1985 work started to be done in Odia in the State Secretariat from April 1985.
 - (5) However, Office of the Registrar, Odisha High Court, Offices of the Justices and their sub-ordinate offices have been kept out of the provisions of this notification. Besides, it does not affect the use of English in the following activities as well:
 - (6) Correspondence with Government of India and other States;
 - (7) Work procedures of any court or Tribunal;
 - (8) Judicial and Quasi-Judicial work procedures and all matters related to or arising out of it;
